Home Communions

Father Richard will take Holy Communion to people at home according to their circumstances. This is a privilege and enables for prayer in the home at difficult times and for the communicant to receive Holy Communion at home. Please never hesitate to contact me if you would like Holy Communion at home if you are unable to come to church because of sickness or being housebound.

Here are some guidelines to assist you:

1. If you can, please arrange a surface with a white cloth upon which I can place the Blessed Sacrament. If this is difficult please do not worry too much but it is appreciated.

- 2. The Priest will not enter into general conversation until after the celebration which lasts about ten minutes. Then he would appreciate a cup of tea and chat with you but if your circumstances don't allow, please do not worry.
- 3. Please consider giving a donation to the Church for the Priest's ministry. He will have had to drive to you and it also enables you to give your weekly collection to support the priestly ministry in the parish / chaplaincy. This means there can be a Priest available for you and for others with a priestly presence in the parish / chaplaincy. It is a long-established custom if you can to make an offering to the Church in thankfulness for the ministry of the Church.
- 4. You don't have to tidy up before the priest arrives! Just prepare spiritually for an encounter with Christ in the Eucharist by being prayerful before his arrival.

Dear friends

Today is Gaudete Sunday and there are two reflections on this week's sheet that focus on its meaning. Please do take time to look at these prayerfully and spend some time this Advent in watching and waiting for the Lord. We have rose as our liturgical colour today which expresses that reality in our lives – the joy of knowing the Lord is near!

From Sunday 5th January the list of people for whom we pray publicly will be started again. If you wish any names to be included *you will need to contact me in an email by Monday 30th December.* **No names will be carried across.** This ensures the prayer list to kept up to date. Remember if you have asked for people to be included *you must have had their permission so to do.* This is important.

Living Gaudete Sunday

This Sunday is traditionally called *Gaudete* Sunday, based on the Introit for the day: *Gaudete in Domino semper, iterum dico, Gaudete*, from Philippians 4:4 ("Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, 'Rejoice'"). Today, this theme is developed most fully in the second reading, which is from 1 Thessalonians. Let's take a closer look at that reading and what is meant by the admonition to "rejoice." It is surely more than feeling mere emotional joy. The goal is a deep, serene, confident and stable joy of the Holy Spirit.

The text says, "Pray without ceasing. In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus. Do not quench the Spirit."

Prayer without ceasing is a discipline of the mind. St. Paul does not mean that we should stay in a chapel all day long. He means that we should be living in conscious contact with God at every moment of our day. To be grateful in all circumstances means that we must remember that "all things work for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose" (Romans 8:28); even the painful things bring forth blessings. The Holy Spirit wants

this grateful spirit to be ours, and we ought not quench his gift to us of being always gratefully aware of God's goodness.

The text says, "Do not despise prophetic utterances. Test everything; retain what is good." First, the phrase "prophetic utterances" refers to Scripture. But there are also approved visions and prophecies that have been permitted us by the Church. Scripture is a prophetic declaration of reality. We ought not to despise God's word in any way, but should accept it wholeheartedly. "Prophetic utterances" also refers to the teachings of the Church, the words of the Fathers of the Church, and the teachings of the saints down through the ages. There is a great deposit of faith that has been carefully collected and lovingly handed down from apostolic times. We, too, ought to seek out every instruction prophetically uttered by Mother Church, allowing nothing to fall to the ground. Approved apparitions, prophecies and spiritual works are also a source for us too; and we should seek out the witness of Mary and the saints of old who kept and handed on the faith.

The text says, "Refrain from every kind of evil. May the God of peace make you perfectly holy; and may you, entirely, spirit, soul and body, be preserved blameless for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. The one who calls you is faithful, and he will also accomplish it." The greatest source of sorrow in our life, the biggest killer of joy, is sin. To the degree that we indulge it, our joy is sapped, but to the extent that we allow the Lord to deliver us from sin and make us more and more holy, our joy becomes deeper and more lasting.

The words "holy" and "whole" are not far removed from each other. As we become more whole, more perfected, freer from sin, more holy and blameless, our joy deepens and we can increasingly "rejoice always." God will do this for us if we are willing and if we ask him.


Thus the mandate, the exhortation, to "rejoice always" is a call to live a stable and serene joy rooted in prayerful gratitude.




Luke 3:10-18

'Someone is coming who will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire'

When all the people asked John, 'What must we do?' he answered, 'If anyone has two tunics he must share with the man who has none, and the one with something to eat must do the same.' There were tax collectors too who came for baptism, and these said to him, 'Master, what must we do?' He said to them, 'Exact no more than your rate.' Some soldiers asked him in their turn, 'What about us? What must we do?' He said to them, 'No intimidation! No extortion! Be content with your pay!'

A feeling of expectancy had grown among the people, who were beginning to think that John might be the Christ, so John declared before them all, 'I baptise you with water, but someone is coming, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to undo the strap of his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.' As well as this, there were many other things he said to exhort the people and to announce the Good News to them.

Homily



This Sunday's Gospel continues last week's focus on John the Baptist and his role in preparing the way for Christ. Recall that last week's reading described John's appearance in the desert and established his connection with the prophetic tradition of Israel. If we were to read Luke's Gospel

continuously, we would learn about John the Baptist challenging the crowds who came to him and calling upon them to show evidence of their repentance. John tells his listeners that they cannot rely on their lineage as Israelites because children of Abraham can be raised up from stones. Repentance, rather, must be observable in one's actions. Here, Luke is continuing to set up two important themes of his Gospel message: the Christian faith is expressed in one's actions, and the call to salvation is extended to everyone, Jews and Gentiles.

In today's Gospel reading, the crowds ask John the Baptist for specifics. What evidence of repentance is required? John replies by naming concrete actions: crowds should share their food and cloaks; tax collectors should be just; soldiers should act fairly. The concern for justice is a hallmark of Luke's Gospel.

When the crowd begins to wonder if John the Baptist might be the Messiah, John interprets his baptism and makes it clear that his ministry is in preparation for the Messiah. John the Baptist knows his place and role in God's plan of salvation. By encouraging the crowd to act similarly in accordance with their stations in life, John's teaching suggests that each person has a role to play in God's salvation. It is the great mystery of our salvation that God permits and even asks for human cooperation in his divine plans.

The third Sunday of Advent is also called Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete is a Latin word that means "rejoice." This name is taken from the entrance antiphon for Sunday's Mass, which is also echoed in today's second reading from the Paul's letter to the Philippians. Some people mark this Sunday by lighting a rose candle instead of a purple one on their Advent wreath. It is a reminder that the Advent season is a season of joy because our salvation is already at hand.
